## Floreana Island

Of the four species of sea turtles in this archipelago, only Pacific green sea turtles nest in these islands. From December to May, the reptiles gather along the sandy beaches to find a mate and nest. The females lay between 60–120 eggs in every nest, and the eggs take approximately 60 days to hatch. Very soon, we will see some of the first hatchlings emerge from those nests. Photo by Javier Carrión
